Dear Parent(s)/Guardian(s):

Governor Murphy announced today that schools will remain closed until June 30th. While the announcement was not unexpected, it is sad that the typical closure activities we have come to enjoy and expect at the end of a school year will be impossible under current social distancing guidelines. Principals have been working on the components of virtual moving up ceremonies as well as a virtual 8th grade graduation. The Department of Education has promised that it will be developing additional guidance for these activities in the near future and we will adjust district plans as that guidance becomes available.

We will continue with virtual/distance learning for the remainder of the school year. As I am sure you have observed, as time goes on our teachers are finding new ways to engage your children and assist in their learning. I continue to be amazed by our teachers ability to adapt to this new virtual world we are all expected to live in. I continue to struggle with Google Meets and remembering to turn on my mic when I want to speak.

There are also other mundane tasks that occur at the end of the year that we will be addressing in the near future. These procedures are currently being worked on by administration and will be shared with you in the coming weeks.
